the formal part of the grant has now been completed with the handing over of the cheque from Federal Member for Gilmore, Joanna Gash, in early

When the original plans were circulated some time ago, concern was expressed by some members of the community, who raised the point that steps had to be negotiated to deliver food to the Main Hall. With the Main Hall being used for food-related functions more often than the Supper Room, this was a

very valid point and these concerns were taken on board.

Discussions were held by the hall committee and as a result of these discussions it has been decided to move the kitchen area down to the lower Main Hall area and do away with the stairs within the kitchen area. The upper area adjacent to the existing kitchen area will be used for much-needed storage. Hall storage has been a major problem for some time, and this will be a welcome addition to the hall.

As a result of this re-think, new plans and specifications are now being drawn up in readiness for council approval.

We are also applying to Council for another loan similar to the previous one used to complete stage one refurbishment of the hall. When the loan is in place it will be used, along with the grant, to construct the

Though it may appear that not much has happened with this project, members of the BCDA have been quietly procuring some major items needed for the internal fix-out: commercial ovens, extraction systems and stainless steel benches are ready for installation.

It is hoped construction can start early in the New Year, depending on council approval.

BUNDANOON CELEBRATES CENTENARY OF **FEDERATION**

A glance at the calendar confirms that we are racing, at somewhat unnerving speed, towards the 100th Birthday of this nation of ours on 1 January 2001.

You will remember from our August edition last year the good news that Bundanoon had been honoured with a grant of \$20,000 under the Federal Government's \$30m National Centenary Program. The project that won the award for Bundanoon was the upgrading of the Soldiers' Memorial Hall and, in particular, the kitchen facilities. Further funds will be needed to complete the kitchen but it is heartening to know that community support for the BCDA has never been greater. Bookings

Having been involved with ICG for more than five years, Paul believes that his season has now come to an end. He writes, "My association with the magazine and with the many people who help to bring it into being has been a rewarding experience. I would like to thank all those who have been part of the JCG team over the years, as well as all those who have supported and contributed in so many ways. I wish the ICG team well and look forward to an ongoing esprit de corps that the magazine has generated in our community."

From BCDA President, Mark Corbett:

It has been largely through Paul's efforts that the Gazette has grown from a 16-page magazine to the 40-page widely read magazine that it is today. The ICG reflects a cross-section of Bundanoon and district community life and has helped to contribute to the vitality and pride of these communities.

The JCG struggled at first to get people to contribute but Paul encouraged new writers. As well as keeping us informed of local news and issues, he introduced a

love of nature, poetry, personal experiences, humour/pictures and puzzles and he was particularly careful over the layout. Latterly, Paul has been encouraging young contributors, and the writings and drawings of the teenagers and primary school pupils have been especially successful.

It is amazing how much creative talent has been discovered in the town. For instance, Mim Smith, whose delightful illustrations appear in most issues, once drew for the Bulletin. John Royal and John Hartley have exten-

sive media and journalism backgrounds and Lyneve Rappell is an editor.

Fifteen people have worked on the publication since Chris Dwyer first mooted the idea of a quarterly magazine to promote the activities of the Bundanoon Community Development Association and to encourage increased membership and attendance of the meetings.

After the BCDA's AGM in February 1995, Chris consulted with Paul, who was recognised as possessing the technological expertise and capabilities of coordinating and preparing a quality magazine lay-out through to

printing stage. As it happened Paul had been toving with the idea of starting up a local publication himself and needed little persuasion to join the BCDA team. At the inaugural meeting it was Paul who came up with the name Jordans Crossing Gazette and, along with the committee consisting of Chris Dwyer, Kate Perkins, Carol Halstead and John Royal, produced the first edition in May 1995.

The outstanding success of the JCG and the size of each edition involves a large workload. Paul has created a successful system of production from which the current editorial team can carry on.

The current team is Kate Perkins, Pam Davies, Don McGill, Mechelle Todd, Lyneve Rappell, Mim Smith, John Hartley and John Royal. This edition, we welcome a new face, Lyn Mulready, to help with the layout and production. Lyn is a local carriage driver and has contributed to the JCG in the past.

Paul has left a strong team with some experience now of putting a magazine together—rather like a master builder who has laid and cemented the blocks carried by his building labourers. He can be justly proud of the legacy he did so much to help create.



for our annual fundraising dinner on 11 November have again been a tremendous success--a complete sell-out, with many people waiting for cancellations! This, of course, was one of the principal reasons why Bundanoon was selected for the federal grant---its "outstanding record of community service and self-help."

A project such as upgrading of the kitchen facilities is not perhaps the most visible of commemorative features---as far as the seeing eye of the public is concerned. So it is rather gratifying to learn that another, and hopefully less costly, project to mark the occasion is on the drawing board, and this one you really will be able to see!

A proposal from one of Bundanoon's senior citizens---that a decent-sized flagpole be erected to provide a lasting symbol of the town's national pride and unity---was given the initial go-ahead at the BCDA's September meeting, and a committee was formed to examine the project in detail. Since then, the Wingecarribee Shire Manager of Strategic Planning, Geoff Lawrence, and local councillor, David Fairall, have both endorsed the feasibility of the idea; and hopefully Council will see fit to come to the party to offset costs. One good sign, as David informs us, is that the Mayor, Phillip Yeo, is also extremely supportive of the concept, in principle.

The town centre site (favoured by Geoff Lawrence as being the most practical from the Council's point of view) is in front of the history shed in Railway Avenue. Another proposal, also being considered by the BCDA committee, is to bury at the site a time capsule containing copies of Jordans Crossing Gazette and other details of day-to-day living in Bundanoon.

More discussion is taking place as we go to print but there are hopeful signs that we will have the pole installed and the flag up and flying in time to celebrate the centenary on New Year's Day 2001. Keep eyes and ears open for developments.



Centenary of Federation

Preparation for Federation began in the 1880s and 1890s. Colonists in all states felt that in a basic cultural sense they were all Australians, yet constitutionally there was no such thing as an Australian nation. Sir Edmund Barton's words, "A Continent for a Nation and a Nation for a Continent" became the proud slogan of many patriots.


In 1889, Sir Henry Parkes' Tenterfield Oration became known by his admirers as a clarion call for federal union. However, it was Sir Edmund Barton who became the first Prime Minister when the nation was proclaimed in 1901. Sir Alfred Deakin followed. He did more than any other politician during the first decade of the Commonwealth to give shape and direction to our national aspirations.

ack in autumn, researchers from Channel 7's Hot Property program focused in on Bundanoon, looking for a community project. What I heard is that they wanted to make a show about your basic horde of locals with some project on the boil. Well a light switched on, and John Sant, president of the Rebels Soccer Club, put up his hand.

Now, the Rebels' home ground---Ferndale Reserve, out on Old Wingello road---is basically a flat paddock with lines drawn on. Lately, however, the sod has been turning. The club has scored a grant to install an underground trickle-fed irrigation system. That should keep the grass on the pitch through summer. Next came floodlights. Both of these projects should be finished and ready to go before the start of the season in March next year. So, what's missing?

Well, when the Rebels played at home to Exeter in July, the Channel 7 crew (Rob, Mark and Tim the cameraman) came down to catch it all on film. But the game wasn't all they caught. They walked in on players changing in the open air---or, more accurately, fog-and I understand the camera copped a lens-full of more than one frozen behind. There, under the sweaty glare of camera lights, Paul Sedgebeer, Frank Davenport, Wayne Todd,

Rocca, and many others, volunteered for parts. But the climax was yet to come. You'd think it would be winning the comp. but you'd be wrong.

Winning the NSW Sport and Recreation grant is where the real excitement lies. The Council's Parks and Maintenance officer, Mark Chapman, showed good form as he helped the committee get the grant application into Council along with the Land Use Application.

As we go to print, the story is not yet over, but as always I watch the action with every expectation of a happy ending. I can see the subtitles rolling up the screen as our team retires from training, tired and muddy, across the miraculously plush turf, away from the supernatural lighting and into the sheltered privacy of ...



Sunnataram Forest Monastery by

Most of us have noticed the orange-robed monks in and around the Southern Highlands and felt some curiosity. When the idea to write about the monastery came up, we truly thought that we had no preconceived ideas of what to expect. In retrospect, we realise we had a picture in our minds of an austere, formal place.

The Sunnataram Forest Monastery is set on 99 acres on the Penrose side of Bundanoon. The beautiful buildings and Buddhist statues are surprisingly in tune with the surrounding eucalypt bush. Ducks and peacocks roam the grounds and the atmosphere is quiet and peaceful.



We passed the most senior monk, who is 93 years old, crouched down working in the garden. We only went for a short walk, but the track leads all the way to a river at the bottom of the valley.

After our walk we talked to another of the monks, Char, who told us a lot about his life in Thailand. We found the monks to be understanding and aware of issues, and they comfortably answered all our questions. There is an obvious blend of cultures, yet the monks seem to manage to maintain their own cultural identity.

We were invited to stay for lunch. The monks sat cross-legged, side-by-side on a platform and we sat Tara Davis (15, Berrima)

cross-legged facing them on the ground. We were served spicy Thai food and then Char gave a talk about some of the principles they live by.

The monks are self-disciplined, eating only once or twice a day and they do not eat after 12 o'clock midday. They rarely sleep more than 4 hours. In keeping with their beliefs and culture, the monks maintain a healthy lifestyle. They discourage alcohol, smoking and other drugs, none of which are allowed within the grounds of the monastery. Char is qualified (in Thailand) to teach physical education. There is an overall enthusiasm for sport and most play a variety of different games.

Although we thought they would be reclusive, the monks are a positive and active part of the community. James teaches yoga, tai chi and meditation. Some of the monks study English at Moss Vale TAFE and we were impressed by their grasp

of the language. Letters of thanks on the notice board showed that they have recently been to Berrima gaol instructing inmates in the art of meditation and that nursing home visits have also been a part of their community involvement.

We were impressed by their openness and enthusiasm, and we felt very welcome.

Their lives and ways of thinking are different and interesting but now we feel less distanced from them. When we see them in the street now we can say "Hi" and know we can go and visit the monastery any time.


Do You Remember? by Lucy Rocca

Do you remember the Praying Nun or the Sphinx or Tooth's Folly?

The Praying Nun was a legacy of the 1939 bushfires. While driving tourists to Echo Point to take in the view and perhaps try for a 'coo-ee' to come back from the bluffs opposite, a driver saw on the left-hand side going towards the shelter shed what he thought was a nun at prayer, On closer inspection it was seen to be a partly burnt stump, a very good likeness of a kneeling figure in a black habit with white face and collar. The driver was very impressed and after some further

inspection proceeded to alert the Progress Association, which had photos taken and generally cleaned the site. The nun knelt at prayer for many years and only disappeared not so long ago. I heard the story of the discovery of the nun many times; the driver was my Dad.

The Sphinx was the work of man rather than the result of a disaster. When Paddys River at Lever Park was cleared and a swimming pool made with a picnic area, the lessee saw potential in a large anthill. The result was a magnificent replicaof the Sphinx, carved with great patience and accuracy. Over the years the Sphinx, like the



Praying Nun, suffered the rayages of weather and age, and finally disappeared.

Tooth's Folly was to provide drinking water for thirsty hikers. The idea was that because it was so far down to the river a small well, cut into the rocks near the road and filled with rainwater, would be just what was needed. Unfortunately, the water became brackish (with maybe the odd drowned wallaby in it) and unfit for use, so Tooth's Folly became the wishing well.

While the Praying Nun and the Sphinx are remembered by many of us, Tooth's Folly predates even the oldest of us, but the Wishing Well is still there to receive our wishes.

hen we came to Bundanoon in 1968 we knew no one, and we weren't sure where to begin to know others. However, our nursing home, which we had bought with much enthusiasm but not much knowledge, was our learning place, and boy did we have fun. Our staff members were our teachers and soon became our friends when they realised we were a young family who just wanted to make people feel cared for and loved in the home. We had ups and downs as any business must, but we gained so much in friendships, not only with our staff but also with the patients, relatives, tradespeople, reps, etc. Bundanoon took us to its heart. We made it plain that we were here to 'do our bit' by the town and the girls on the manual telephone exchange certainly took us at our word; even when we went out to dinner they would find us and I would be called to an accident (only one-man ambulances in those days). Or I would find myself, at dawn, attending a golfer with a suspected heart attack; Bundanoon Golf Course was beautiful but tough! The doctors would call and ask me to turn out and do 'an assessment' till they could get here, and it was flattering that they trusted my reports---no community nurses in those days!

Some of the characters we cared for will still be remembered by some of the townsfolk. Our darling Granny Grice who at 102 years of age declined sleeping tablets "because they might be habit forming". The same lady at

one stage shared a room with her niece who was only 88 years old, and it was hilarious to hear the older lady keep the younger one in order! I tried to demonstrate the use of a quad walking stick to Granny Grice and her response was "well I hope I don't look as silly as you do with that thing."

Another of our darling oldies was mortified when I employed a male night nurse and she dared him to go near her. Guess who cried when he left!

We quickly gained a reputation for being a fun place to work and always had a long waiting list of would-be employees. Our children brought their friends home, and they all became an integral part of our extended family. Our patients knew what the kids were doing in play and at school and they all joined in our joy at our newest family addition born at Bowral Hospital. When we added a Murray Grey cattle stud to the property I think we had a party every time a new calf was born. And our every success was supported by an old gentleman who would make a wonderful speech of congratulations to all the staff and toast us with a cup of tea. This same oldie could recite Banjo Patterson by the hour.

They were happy days when we could care for the patients and for each other and words like 'bureaucracy', 'accountability' and 'harassment' were not in our vocabulary, and we had time to touch, talk and listen.

Our Carnival of Scarecrows got off to a good start on the 30 September, and a drive around the village proved just how creative and inventive our residents are. A new dimension has certainly been added to our yearly Garden Ramble with plenty of smiles and chuckles around the streets of our village.

The work on the track continues, with most of the beautiful rock wall on the flat area now exposed and weed free. We will be following up any recalcitrant blackberries with some treatment in the spring.

After obtaining permission from our neighbours, council personnel will now be able to access and remove piles of weeds from the track, hopefully in the very near future.

There is a great deal of evidence of wombat activity on the track, and two Eastern Grey Kangaroos were sighted nearby at the beginning of August. A swamp wallaby was seen at the top of the track earlier this year. These are very good signs that we are not disturbing the habitat too much.

We should be able to start replanting natives as soon as the blackberry problem has been overcome. The ivy is starting to

die in the trees, but unfortunately it is too late to save the trees. We are leaving them as nesting and perching sites for the many birds which frequent the area.

There are now about ten volunteers working on the track and we welcome anyone who would like to join us on the second Sunday each month from 9.00am until 12.00 noon. For further information please call John Dorman on 4883 6296.

ere are some significant items, abstracted mainly from the local paper The Scrutineer.

1876 About 2 miles on the Sydney side of Jordans Crossing, a timber mill with its own rail siding was milling sleepers for the rail extensions then approaching Wagga Wagga. A second mill was connected by a 1/2-mile tramway. The staff of about 100 men was assisted by 110 bullocks and 25 horses.

1884 The building of the Goods Shed commenced. The Bowral Free Press news reporter recorded on 31 December, "... it is a nice compact little building."

1890 The Progress Committee resolved to press for Bundanoon to become a stopping place for the Melbourne Express and the Express Goods (Paper Train), and for a summer service between Mittagong and Bundanoon.

1891 The Scrutineer criticised the long hours of duty required for the Station Master---a seven day week of 12 hour days, having no breaks from that routine in two or three years. And in the following year, the new residence for the Station Master was also criticised, being only 25 by 28 feet, insufficient for his family of eight.

1892 Kareela Station was downgraded to part-time service during slack periods. That was the next stop south of Bundanoon. In July, the Railway Commissioners visited Bundanoon and announced major revisions to passenger services. The Scrutineer

RAILROADING in the EARLY DAYS

said, "The people at Bundanoon cannot grumble at the Commissioners nor say they are very hard men to deal with."

1896 Ornamental trees were sent by the Botanical Department for planting at Bundanoon Station.

1903 Bundanoon Station garden, pronounced as "the finest on the Southern line" by the visiting Railway Commissioners.

1906 The State Governor, Sir Harry Rawson, arrived by train and was greeted by the Public School children, to whom he proposed a holiday be soon proclaimed and he would get the Minister to do that. After luncheon he attended the laying of the foundation stone of Holy Trinity Church.

1906 It was proposed that the station verandah be raised and the platform lengthened. Minimum excursion fares set at 2d per mile 1st class, and 1d per mile 2nd class.

1908 Easter arrivals: "On Thursday evening last ... train after train drew up to the platform and the visitors made their way to the several accommodation houses." Later in the same year, a group of about 80 day-picnickers arrived from Goulburn, dancing in the evening at Tyler's Hall after the day spent at Fairy

1914 The southbound Temora Mail collided head-on with the locomotive of a goods train at Exeter. This occurred at midnight in heavy fog. There were fatalities and serious injuries, and many carriages and wagons were destroyed. An inquest was held the next day in Goulburn, and the driver and fireman of the mail train judged responsible. They lost their jobs.




Drama, Drama and More Drama

My feelings for drama are very strong, because one day it could be very important.




My Biggest Achievement

part of the 'thin green line' or 'Greensleeves'.


A big accolade goes to the Fairbrother children, who held the fort at home so that their parents could attend.

Most were given free tickets to athletic events and to the Closing Ceremony, after queuing for 1 1/2







Friends of the MORTON NATIONAL PARK

the Friends are looking forward to working with the National Parks and Wildlife Service on a number of projects in the Bundanoon section of the Morton National Park, including:

- · up-grading of lookouts
- up-grading of roads
- new interpretation
- improving the camping area
- restoration of the steps to Fairy Bower.

Work on the roadways has already been completed; also new toilets have been installed at the Echo Point picnic area.

We continue to keep the walking tracks in the park free of undergrowth and overgrowth on our monthly working bees, and on one of these a few months ago we were joined by Peta Seaton, Member for Southern Highlands. In spite of her demanding sched-

ule as Shadow Minister for the Environment, Peta Seaton makes time to become acquainted with groups such as ours, and demonstrated that she is no novice when it comes to lopping overhanging branches. It was a pleasure to have her with us. Incidentally, two of our members, who are regular participants in working bees, are Sydney residents who are undeterred by the distance they have to travel to be here.

Quite apart from its obvious attractions, the park at Bundanoon and the Blue Mountains also has some rare plants and fungi:

- Murphy's Zieria (Zieria murphyi) is found only in Bundanoon and the Blue Mountains--nowhere else.
- A new Guinea Flower (Hibbertia praemorsa) has just been described and is only confirmed for Bundanoon, with a possible small population in the Northern Budawangs.

- Fairy Lanterns (Thismia sp.), an unusual underground plant that is all white except for its flower, has been discovered here. Only one species of Thismia has ever been described for Australia. If that is our species, we have the only known site at present in NSW; if not, we have a new species. Either way, we have found a plant that is very rare. We are now eagerly waiting to find a flower.
- A strange purple pine fungus, thought to be Hydnellum fraudulentum grows here. This fungus has only previously been reported from an undisclosed locality in Victoria.

Christmas will not be too far distant by the time this issue of the Gazette is published. To all readers, the Friends of Morton National Park take the opportunity to extend **Seasons Greetings**.




The Bundanoon Croquet Club's Annual General Meeting gave the club a new committee determined to carry on the good work of the previous committee.

Above: The Olympic Torch being carried along Railway Parade. (Note the train on time in the background).


