

The first order for 90 metres of tartan cloth (made of medium weight 100% worsted wool) has been placed with the traditional weavers, Dalgleish of Selkirk, Scotland and, depending on the demand, more orders will be placed following Brigadoon.

Bundanoon folk can be 'first come, first served' by placing their individual orders now with Peter Rocca at the Peter Rocca Real Estate Agency, Railway Parade, Bundanoon. Peter reckons you will need something like 4 metres of cloth for a kilt or a skirt, or these can be made up for you if required. Orders are also being taken for tam o'shanters, ties, caps and shawls.

Well known Bundanoon identity, Pat Green, a member of the BHG Committee, was the first to raise the possibility of designing a tartan to represent the local district, and the idea was subsequently taken up with enthusiasm by other committee members, including Val Hadfield, who happens to be a retired professional kilt maker (which helps, of course!) and by Vice President Peter Rocca who went away and actually designed the tartan.

It's fairly safe to say that Peter Rocca knows more about tartan design now than he did 3 years ago when the topic first came up for discussion. As he explains, 'One of the first lessons I learnt was that a tartan is worked on thread count. Now, I may be able to count but I know absolutely nothing about the intricacies of cloth weaving, so I went in search of help and luckily found it in the person of Betty Johnson who owns her own House of Tartans in Canberra.' According to Peter, the Bundanoon District Tartan design owes a lot to the expertise and generous help of Betty Johnson.

The tradition of the tartan goes back into the mists of Highland time when the colours woven into the cloth came from local vegetable dyes and signified an area as much as the clan that inhabited the area.

The colours chosen for the Bundanoon District Tartan tell the story of the village and its surrounds. The pattern is based on a green background (the word Bundanoon means deep green gullies) with yellow, from the wattles growing in the bush, the red of the waratah (our Shire's floral emblem), blue from the sky and a touch of white representing the mists. Blue and yellow, of course, are the traditional colours of the Bundanoon sporting teams and of Bundanoon Public School. You may also notice in the tartan design the feature of parallel lines acknowledging the arrival of the railway line that opened up the district back in the 1860's.

Remember, any reader of this community magazine is entitled to wear a kilt, a skirt, a tam o'shanter, a cap, a shawl or a tie made up of our very own local tartan. Order one now and wear it with pride at Brigadoon 2000!

# BCDA'S ANNUAL COMMUNITY DINNER

The BCDA's last annual community dinner of the Century was a wonderful evening full of surprises.

The tickets had all gone weeks in advance. The evening was organised by Michael and Coralie Flint, Pam Davies and Kate Perkins, who has been involved with the dinner since its inception in 1996. Thanks to both real estate agents who assisted with the bookings. Coralie Flint, an expert calligrapher, had hand written all the invitations and the tickets, as well as the individual dinner menus and place tags.

With Michael and Coralie's television and theatrical background, they made sure we were hit with tremendous impact the moment we entered the hall. They had draped 62 metres of black cloth around the hall, from below the windows to the floor, partly for decorative effect, but mainly to improve the acoustics. Against the black curtaining, however, they hung bunches of red fire-wheel proteas with wonderful dramatic effect. Thanks must go to Sue Leirch of the Protea Farm for donating flowers, and to Riita Fenwick for stage decoration. Instead of having separate tables for parties of eight or ten, as in the past, the tables were set out in four long lines banqueting-style down the hall. The idea - which succeeded - was to get more people in; to make serving easier; and to make it more convenient for individuals or couples to attend on their own. This fulfilled the spirit of the theme for the evening - "Side by Side". Here again the creative talents of Michael and Coralie paid off. The long tables were all laid with white damask cloths with dark green runners. Red candles and pots of flame-red poinsettias added the friendly finishing touch.

Oh yes - what about the food!

Pam Davies, who has a reputation for gourmet catering, was proposed, seconded and elected as Chef by the Entertainment Committee before she had time to protest that 12 people had been a crowd at Mildenhall, and catering for 180 or more was totally unheard of as far as she was concerned. Never done it before? Too late. You're it!

Pam immediately went to inspect the kitchen facilities. She found that both ovens were unserviceable and there was no hot water other than what she could heat up in the urn. Mark Corbett told her that unfortunately the brand spanking new kitchen to be built with Federal Government assistance to commemorate the Centenary of Federation hadn't yet been started, and we'd be lucky if it was ready for next year's dinner! Pam promptly consulted Neville Christensen of Idle-a-Wite who had been involved in previous BCDA community diners, then she rolled up her sleeves. Came the night, everything went like clockwork. Extra members were squeezed in to make it 188 seated at table (against the target of 180) and it was more like a gourmet feast than a dinner.

Two production teams were organised - one for the kitchen and the other for the hall. (Continued on page 7)

### The Circus Came To Town

The circus!! What visions of glamour and exotic lifestyles came to mind when it was learned the circus was coming town. What visions were conjured up of trapeze artists, of tight-rope walkers, of clowns and bare back riders and performing animals and maybe a unicyclist. And the animals - so different from what a small town was used to. A lion (somewhat mangy, it must be said), diminutive horses, a large elephant or two to help put up the big top and pull the cages of the other animals, and most exotic, some camels (definitely smelly and inclined to bite, but certainly different). And the caravans the circus people lived in, all painted in such bright colours.

The Big Top (well, medium-sized top) was erected and young and old all seemed to have an excuse to visit the circus. Those strange people who lived in caravans, so different from what we were used to, and how lucky the children were not having to go to school and having all those wonderful animals to look after.

At last the night for the performance and excitement was running high, but first a parade through the town of all the performers and animals, escorted by our Mounted Policeman. All went well until the police horse sighted the camels, when according to a report, 'Troop horse no. 736 died of fright after an encounter with a camel'. We are only left to guess how Constable Rudge, who was riding police horse no. 736 at the time, felt about this. However, we can be sure that that day in 1936 when the circus came to town was well remembered by him.

A large number of local youth from Bundanoon primary school-age upwards (with the occasional Mum) had been recruited to help, reinforced by some students from Moss Vale High who were members of a hospitality course. Inspiration for the menu came from Stephanie Alexander's Cook's Companion.

An army of helpers washed lettuce, chopped vegetables, cooked 20 kg of potatoes, prepared 22 kg of chicken salad and baked 17 lemon cakes. It was truly a community dinner!

In the hall a long serving table stood below the stage and on this the platters of food were placed ready for serving. Four production line filled platters for entrees and desserts and served individual plates of the main course to the guests. And they weren't mean. There was plenty for everyone. Entree consisted of zucchini slice, poached asparagus with yoghurt and dill dressing, cherry tomatoes in basil vinaigrette, and Paddy's bread. Main course was delicious cold chicken (supplied by Martin Rocca) and special leg ham (from Di's Deli) salad, with celery, cucumber and peanuts, new potatoes in olive oil and cracked peppers, mixed soft leaf salad, couscous and mushroom ala-Greque. Dessert was lemon cake with brandied apricots and almonds. Tea, coffee and chocolates followed. Considering it was all prepared at short notice under inadequate conditions it was an extraordinary feat to which many local people contributed. When the new kitchen is available it will be possible (if required) to provide hot cooked meals.

#### Can't wait!

The brain-teaser Quiz prepared by Coralie included a 'Name-that-Tune' segment skilfully presented by Ray Alldridge. Between courses the short, but very popular, musical segment of community singing was led expertly by Nan and Jim Thomson.

During the evening BCDA President, Mark Corbett, welcomed the guests including David Fairall, the new Shire Councillor, who is a Bundanoon resident, and Cir David Wood, the former Mayor, who in the past has always helped and encouraged Bundanoon to develop its capabilities through self-help. Mark also paid special tribute to Paul Gleeson and the editorial team of the Jordans Crossing Gazette. He said the JCG was the force that was bringing Bundanoon people together as a stimulating and thriving community, and should be supported by everyone.

A highly successful raffle was won by Des and Kate Perkins' daughter-in-law Jane, who had driven from Sydney with husband Tim to help on the evening. Mark Corbett sprang a surprise on me by presenting me with a beautiful Certificate of Appreciation. I was taken completely unawares and would like here to again express my thanks to all. Bundanoon remains high in our affections.

Fear gripped my heart. She wasn't kidding and meant to subject me to my worst nightmare - another airline flight.




### The Country Women's Association

### **Yellow Paper Clips**



When the Gulf War broke out, a woman in America heard about soldiers in the service who had no family and needed pen pals. Letters addressed to "Any Soldier" were distributed by commanding officers who noticed any soldiers getting little or no mail. Georgia wrote to 25 such soldiers almost daily, most of them men. Keeping up with 25 pen pals on a daily basis almost consumed Georgia's time and talents. She sent poems, little stories, and words of hope and encouragement. When there were time constraints, she would write one letter and copy it for everyone. Greetings were sent whenever she knew about a special event, like a birthday. One day, Georgia received a letter from a soldier who was depressed and discouraged. She pondered as to how she could help lift his spirit. It was then that she noticed that at work there were paperclips of various colours. Georgia took one of the yellow paper clips and photo copied it in the palm of her hand. She sent this picture with the paper clip with the following message: "This yellow paperclip that you see in my hand represents a hug that I am sending to you. You can carry this paperclip in a pocket or anywhere, and whenever you feel down, you can just touch and hold it and know that somebody cares about you, and would give you a hug if she were there. Georgia sent a copy of this picture along with a paperclip and the message to each of her other correspondents. After the war ended, Georgia received one of the pictures of her hand holding the yellow paperclip, and on the back were over 150 signatures of people who had been given her "hug". During the years, Georgia named other paperclips. Pink came to mean a kiss, green was for good luck, and so on. Years later, Georgia was giving a class as part of a seminar for positive thinking. She shared with the members of the class her paperclip symbolism, and made a bracelet of multicoloured paperclips for each of them. One of the women exclaimed, "So you're the one!" The class member told Georgia that she was visiting her brother and needed something to hold papers together. She had noticed a yellow paperclip on the refrigerator held there with a magnet. She borrowed the paperclip for her papers. When the brother saw it, he grabbed it and scolded her, and told her never to touch the vellow paperclip again. Now she knew why. No one will ever know how far her message has spread, nor how many lives have been touched by a simple yellow paperclip.



You would probably put ERNEST TWIST in the 'attracted to' group. Ernest's Railway Parade studio is open to the public frequently and his work includes a wide variety of subjects and media. Australian born, Ernest has held many exhibitions in the Southern Highlands as well as Sydney and the Blue Mountains. He has exhibited in Paris and New York and his work now features in a number of international collections. He is a self taught artist who spent the first 10 years of his working life as a signwriter and 20 years in advertising as a manager and art director.

Ernest and his wife, Annette, started coming to Bundanoon as weekenders and for a number of years his work was displayed at the Bundanoon Gallery and the Molonga Gallery in Erith Street. They bought a home here in 1994 and became permanent Bundanoon residents in 1998.

Best known for his detailed pen and ink drawings, Ernest was commissioned by a major publishing house to illustrate a book used internationally and his list of Bundanoon commissions and patrons is growing. If you've dined at *The Highlander* lately you'll recognize his work. I think his pen and ink vignettes are quite delightful.

BRUCE PRIOR can turn his hand to anything but he's been a master potter for almost 30 years. New Zealand born and educated in Auckland, Bruce came to Australia in 1970. He taught ceramics at Cessnock TAFE and established and operated the Martinsville Pottery from 1972 until 1988 when he and Fiona established the Bundanoon Pottery and Gallery.

Definitely in the 'attracted to' group, Bruce is concerned with quality of life issues involving the right balance of home and family, artistic development, professional satisfaction and good citizenship. His work is exhibited in New Zealand and New South Wales Galleries and many of his art pieces have found their way to Japan.


Bruce looks to the Living National Treasure, Mr Shoji Hamada, for artistic inspiration and his creative pieces are founded on ancient Japanese techniques, but he also enjoys a niche market supplying the craft trade.

**IB** ODFELDT lived and worked in his Erith street studio for 11 years and his prodigious output of painting and sculpture covered a wide variety of subjects and styles including some allegorical stuff after the style of Francis Bacon. A self-taught artist, he was interested in drawing at an early age and his vocational training in the course of becoming a marine engineer was put to good effect in his heavy metal sculpture. Ib's background, his sense of history and his professional training led him into the very specialized field of marine art. Born in the Danish harbour city of Aarlborg, he was a seaman at 21 and he later served with the Danish Merchant Navy in the Far East and Australasia. We reminisced about visiting Shanghai but his interest in marine history is focused very much on Australia, the vessels associated with migration to this country and those trading in the northern waters.


Ib has been commissioned, both internationally and in Australia by corporate and private clients. A number of his exhibitions have been purchased by shipping companies and for private commissions. Ib likes to provide with the painting several pages of concise but detailed history of the vessel. His deep love of the sea and ships, his ability to present naval architecture accurately and his masterly painting skills have been recognized by the Australian Society of Marine Artists. His painting of the 'Nella Dan' - the Danish ship so long associated with Australian Antarctic expeditions - is part of the permanent exhibition of the Melbourne Maritime Museum and arguably he is the most famous marine artist in Australia.

With his sense of maritime and colonial history, and a new commission from P&O, Ib has decided to spend some time in Hobart but I shall always remember his comment about the complexity of his marine paintings - some of the smaller ones only take forty minutes - and forty years.


Then I met JOCK LAINE. I'd been told that Jock does book illustrations and I suppose that is technically correct but it is something of an understatement and I'm not sure how to begin. Jock was born in Finland and his family emigrated in 1959. He told me that during the past 11 years he had moved away briefly but returned realizing that Bundanoon was the right place for him. He trained as a carpenter and is a self-taught musician, building and repairing stringed instruments. Jock is also a self-taught artist. His exquisitely executed large format coloured pencil drawings will one day illuminate a manuscript. Jock said he is blessed with the ability to see simple concepts very clearly and he likes to contemplate the goodness described in so many of the world's cultures. He is well down the track writing a book with a 'fantasy' theme and I was impressed.




"The Harvest' - coloured pencil drawing by Jock Laine

Collection of high fired stoneware pottery by Bruce Pryor





# MONIES IN BUNDANOON

Movies were first shown in Bundanoon in 1924 in what was known as 'Tyler's Hall'. It was owned by Miss Ella Tyler who owned the Royal Hotel - now the Bundanoon Hotel. The Hall used to be where the Hotel swimming pool now stands.

The proprietor of the Picture Show was Mr Roger Terry, who was licensee of the Royal Hotel, and later built the Bundanoon Golf Course.

The first movies, like most other theatres of the time, were silent movies, until about 1928. As electricity had not yet come to Bundanoon, a portable generator was used to supply power to the Hall and projection room. Around 1928 sound was introduced and so ended the era of the silent screen.

The early operators in Tyler's Hall were Jack Hillier, assisted by Tony Lopes. Screenings continued here until the 'Soldiers Memorial Hall' was built in 1934. At this time, Mr Terry transferred his show to the new hall and continued screening until his death in 1939.

At this stage, the Picture Show came under the ownership of Mr Lou Terry, a nephew of Mr Roger Terry, with Jack Hillier and Bob Hayman as operators. This continued until the early 1950's when the theatre closed down.

In June 1956 the theatre was reopened by a Mr Fred Baxter who came from Sydney. The operators then were Bob Hayman and Ross Counsell. After two years Bob Hayman retired and the show them continued with John Simcox and myself as operators. Movie nights continued twice weekly until about 1965, but with competition from television and the late night closing of hotels, the theatre closed again.

Several attempts were made by the Bundanoon Community Development Association to keep the theatre open and functioning, mostly on a voluntary basis, however it finally closed. The plant, screen and projectors to this day remain in the Hall and projection room, and on my last visit were still in operating condition. In recent years the BCDA have very successfully shown movies several times a year.

'Tyler's Hall' was pulled down at the end of 1934 by Mr Joe Counsell and rebuilt as two houses - one owned by Mrs Gwen Tarrant and the other is in Old Wingello Road at the bottom of Hill Street.







### OGDEN'S REST ... AND ALL THE REST

DO YOU REMEMBER? THEN, LOOKOUT, HERE COMES THE REST!

[If you have suffered the misfortune of missing PART ONE of my story (last issue), I have been discussing the 25 lookouts that are dotted along the edge of the escarpment overlooking Bundanoon Creek gorge.]

### 3. RIVERVIEW SECTION (Riverview entrance - via Gullies and Riverview Roads):

Amphitheatre: This lookout is near the top of the Amphitheatre walking track which commences at the end of the light fork of Riverview Road. The track which starts here descends and follows along under the cliffs to Fairy Bower Fails. This popular walking track is known as Nicholas Pass, named after W.A. Nicholas who operated the famous mail-order "pill factory" in Bundanoon late last century, and who donated land to both the Church of England and the Catholic Church.


Mark Morton: Named after the "founder" of the park which bears his name, this is, in my opinion, probably the best of them all. It is located at the very end of the left fork of Riverview Road, and can be accessed by 4WD or by walking about one kilometre from the car park at the Riverview entrance to the park where there is an old cattle grid. The walk is level all the way, except for the short downhill approach to the lookout. Recently, a new fence was installed here which makes it an excellent and safe place to view the magnificent Bundanoon Creek gorge. This lookout is only one of a handful of lookouts from which one may view the actual water in Bundanoon Creek far below you - the others being the next one, Riverview, Buchanan's Lookout (Mark Morton's "twin" on the opposite side of the large gully of Dimmock's Creek) and Ross Lookout.

Riverview: Close to Mark Morton (a short walking track joins the two), it looks down into Dimmock's Creek gully as it joins Bundanoon Creek. The fence here was recently extended and repaired to make it safer for viewing. A fine outlook, but the view is not as extensive as at Mark Morton.

Another lookout, Hopetoun, is mentioned in old tourist guides, but does not appear on any of the maps. From the description given, I believe it may be a former name for Mark Morton Lookout.

### 4. OLD LOOKOUTS SECTION (via Glow Worm Glen track - no vehicular access):

Buchanan's: This is the first lookout situated in that section of the park which is not regularly maintained by the N.P. & W.S.: and is not promoted for tourism - hence there are no signs to assist you to find your way. All the lookouts in this section, constructed at the beginning of the century, have long been neglected, and the fences are very old and rusty - certainly not to be leant against! Please take extra care if venturing into this area. However, it is a very wild and beautiful part of our park for those who care to do so. Buchanan's and its "twin", Mark Morton, seem to complement each other - both have splendid views of the water, but whereas Mark Morton looks upstream, Buchanan's looks downstream. Access is via a track (mostly level walking) branching off the main Glow Worm Glen track, but it is not sign-posted. [The track to Buchanan's is actually the first part of a long track to the old Ringwood Coal Mine - a full day's walk out and back, and only recommended to the fittest, or to the experienced bushwalker.] The lookout was named after Jack Buchanan who operated the old corner store (now partly demolished) opposite the Bundanoon Hotel in partnership with a chap named Fred Posker in the 1920's and 1930's.



Ellsmore: Some distance further north along the escarpment one will find this next lookout - somewhat similar to Buchanan's (but without the water view), and a fence in similar poor condition. Between these two lookouts there are no fewer than three gullies to cross, and a track that becomes increasingly harder to follow. This lookout was named after a well-known identity, the late Herbert Ellsmore, a former Shire President.

MacNab's: The first of a series of four lookouts located fairly close together, and all virtual cliff-hangers, with decaying fences. Not for the faint-hearted! MacNab's is a "forgotten" lookout, as it is off the main track, and the short branch track to it is overgrown. Named after the McNab family who owned "The Shack" Guest House in Ferndale Road earlier this century.

Morgan's Wire Rope: This intriguinglynamed lookout is the site of a heavy wire rope that used to hang over the clifforiginally used in connection with hauling logs across the gorge by flying-fox. However, some years ago, this (rusted) rope broke off at the cliff-edge and fell to the floor of the valley.

The remaining piece still lies on the ground (albeit half-hidden by scrub and silt) adjacent to the lookout, and extending back into the bush some distance where it was (and still is) anchored to a large old tree. The lookout is just off the main track, but is easily visible from it. It is only a short distance past MacNab's. Unfortunately, I know nothing, as yet, about this fellow, Morgan, except that he owned a wire rope, and probably a flying-fox as well!

Coal Seam View: A little further along the escarpment, and the only lookout in this section that is right on the main track. A similar view to Morgan's Wire Rope, except that one now gains a good view of the junction of Bundanoon and Stonequarry Creek gorges. One is supposed to see also a coal seam on the opposite side of the gorge, but it seems that the seam is no longer to be seen (forest growth?).

Ross: The last lookout in this series, and just off the main track. This lookout offers an even better panorama of the junction of the gorges, and gives a good view of the water in Bundanoon Creek. It is only a short distance past Coal Seam View, but has a more northerly aspect. It was named after Charles Ross whose wife's name was "Nell" and who owned "Rosnel" Guest House from about 1920 to 1950. He was also a former Shire President.


Between Ross Lookout and the next one, Balk (a considerable distance), lies the magnificent Christmas Bush Glen - a deep ravine, and one of the most spectacular places in our park. If only this glen were more accessible, it would be an even greater attraction than the popular Glow Worm Glen. There are supposed to be glow-worms here, too, but no one is prepared to go up there in the dark to find out!

Balk: This lookout, beyond the glen, is a little off the track, and difficult to locate for three reasons. Firstly, any side-track leading to it has disappeared; secondly, there is a rock shelf that hides the lookout from view until you are almost on top of it; and thirdly (and unfortunately), a large fallen tree has virtually demolished the fence. This lookout was named after a guy called "Balk" who was Station Master at Bundanoon in the 1930's.

Grice: This next lookout is quite close to Ringwood Coal Mine, and only a short distance beyond Balk. If one is observant, it can be spotted just off the track as you reach the old mine cuttings. It was named after one of the Grice family, possibly Joseph who lived at "Lynbrook" - now the Y.H.A. Hostel.

Ringwood Coal Mine: One comes, at last, to the old coal mine site. This place is also historically fascinating, but must be the subject of a separate story. There is actually no formed lookout here (hence no fence), although one can, of course, view the gorge from near the edge of the cliff above the old mine entrance (which is located towards the bottom of the cliff-face, and can't be seen from the top). It should be noted that the creek below you here is not Bundanoon Creek, but Stonequarry Creek. The walking track ends here, but it didn't many years ago - it went on to one further lookout.

Ogden's Rest: Yes, finally the secret of that elusive place is out! Ogden's Rest, situated beyond Ringwood mine and near the northern boundary of Morton National Park, is a forgotten lookout, and the last lookout marked on all old maps. Any track leading to it has long been overgrown. It was named after a chap called Ogden (no kidding!) who conducted a guest house called "Netherway" in Railway Avenue in the 1930's. I "guest" he sure needed a rest after walking all that distance! This is a unique one because it is the only formed lookout from which one gains a view of the junction of Stonequarry and Indigo Creeks, and what a view it is! (A bluff between the lookout and the old mine prevents any such view from the mine site.) A good aspect of the continuation of the Stonequarry Creek gorge is gained, but as one cannot see into Indigo Creek gorge, I can only guess what's beyond. Maybe, one day, I'll find out.



# 'WHAT EXACTLY GOES ON UP THERE AT KILLARNEY?'

Having overheard this question many times, it seems community interest needs to be satisfied!

Killarney at Bundanoon is a retreat facility which is owned and operated by the registered charity Quest for Life Foundation, established by Petrea King in 1990. Killarney is not only a haven for those who have serious illness, although Petrea enjoys well deserved high regard for her work with those with cancer, HIV/AIDS and other life-threatening illness. Anyone who is seeking more peace in their lives will find help and solace here.

In her many years of counselling, naturopathy and teaching, and during her own illness, Petrea noticed that many people question their priorities, their direction and their sense of meaning. Whether the crisis or crossroad faced is precipitated by illness, the sudden death or diagnosis of a loved one, retrenchment, aging, an accident or any other challenge, more and more people are asking "is this the sort of life I thought I'd have?" and "what can I do to regain a sense of control over my life?".

For many, learning how to take better care of ourselves, especially if we are carers of others, is an important beginning. Petrea teaches, "We have 168 hours in a week and all of them are yours. It is your responsibility to learn to use them in ways that do not lead to resentment and which ensure that you nourish your body, mind and spirit."

The fast pace of life and the stresses in work and school life are becoming increasingly less attractive to many. Those seeking a place of calm for themselves and their families may move from city to country, may change their lifestyle or job and still find they don't feel calm inside. At *Killarney at Bundanoon* Petrea and her team offer many fesources and supports to help people find peace in their mind, body and spirit. Meditation, particularly, has been extraordinarily helpful to many and Petrea has responded to the many requests from clients to produce a range of tapes on meditation, guided imagery and teachings based on her books, and these are very popular.

### Southern Highlanders benefit from Killarney

Local businesses benefit as Killarney is bringing a new and wider group of visitors to Bundanoon, as well as attracting new residents to move to the area. Their publicity is publicity for the Southern Highlands, especially for Bundanoon.

Local people are welcome for lunch and to wander in the grounds of Killarney. It's \$10 for one of Claudeen's delicious low fat smorgasbord lunches. (Call and book in by 11 am please.) You can participate in the daily program (\$35, including lunch) or attend a support group or hear Petrea speak (Mon, Tues, Wed). You are welcome to book in for a massage, a counselling session, a Bowen therapy or bodywork session and to have a look through the shop. The *Quest for Life* shop sells Petrea's books and tapes as well as other books and rainbow products and gifts. The World Peace Flame is housed at Killarney and community members can light their own candles from it.

Killarney and Brigadoon

There has been some community concern that the beautiful grounds at Killarney are no longer available to campers during Brigadoon. The Board of the *Quest for Life Foundation* and the staff at Killarney regret that they are unable to support this function directly, as the legal structure of the charity's memorandum of association prevents them opening as a general purpose camping site. Some twin share rooms are available at a special 2 night rate for Friday and Saturday.





The Reverend Christopher Paine will take up ministry in the Moss Vale Church (with worshipping communities at Bundanoon and Robertson) this month.


